

Round 4 at our new home ground saw our boys snare a point, and the season had gained momentum. We began to string together a number of positive performances.


Jack & Josh in goals began to find their feet & put together some fine games, and stopped the flow of goals.







Again well done to everyone, hope to see you all back next year at the Giants to play some soccer learn a few new skills and have fun!





But more importantly the improvement in the skills and determination of the players was so obvious. Team work was increasing and so was the level of enjoyment the boys were receiving.



Looking forward to seeing everyone next season.







Lauren Mc: started the season as centre forward and scored many of the teams goals; then put in an impressive performance as mid-fielder.


Kayla: Played a great game as half until injury mid-way through the season.

Irene: A quiet mid-field achiever who pushed through some great passes to her forward. Tireless in defence.


